We cannot satisfac torily reply to your enquiry as to whether it is worth patenting or not. Such questions are often proposed to us, but it would require prophetic knowledge to deter-mine them. We can only say in general, that a new and useful improvement is worth the trifling expense of a patent.

E. T. L., of Va.-We would infer that a daguerreotype of the moon placed under a microscope would reveal the most minute objects on its surface, but this has been done under a powerful instrument without satisfactory results. The daguerreotype was large-six inches in diameter.

G. B. C., of N.Y.—We shallawait further instruction in regard to your case.

L. W.B., of Mass.-It will be avery difficult matter to remove the incrustation from your water pipe. A dilute acid can do it, but how can you apply it? It is our opin-ion that you will have to lift the pipes and lay in a new set
