The Patent Laws, enacted by Congress on the 2d of March, 1851 are

now in full to ce, and prove to be of great benefit to all parties who are concerned in new inventions.

The law abolishes discrimination in fees required of foreigners, excepting natives of such countries as discriminate against citizens of the United States—thus allowing Austrian, French, Belgian, English Russian, Spanish and all other foreigners, except the Canadians, te enjoy all the privileges of our patent system (except in cases of de signs) on the above terms. Foreigners cannot secure their inventions by filing a caveat; to citizens only is this privilege accorded.

HOW TO MAKE AN APPLICATION FOR A PATENT. Every applicant for a patent must furnish a model of his invent susceptible of one; or, if the invention is a chemical production, he is susceptible of one; or, it the invention is a chemical production, ne must furnish samples of the ingredients of which his composition consists, for the Patent Office. These should be securely packed, the nventor's name marked on them, and sent, with the Government fees, by express. The express charge should be pre-paid. Small models from a distance can often be sent cheaper by mail. The models from a distance can often be sent cheaper by mail. The safest way to remit money is by a draft on New York, payable to the order of Mesars. MUNN & CO. Persons who live in remote parts of the country can usually purchase drafts from their merchants on their New York correspondents; but, if not convenient to do so, there is out little risk in sending bank bills by mail, having the letter regis tered by the postmaster.
