B. of Mass."—You are correct in regard to the pressure of the air at the lower end of the pipe, but could it not be doubled and the other end united with the first pipe with a valve opening into it, and in this manner get the whole weight of the columns of air to assist the pump. Condensed air becomes hot, or rather gives out its heat and as it expands absorbs it.

"J. M. of N. Y."—Copal varnish is the best we know of for your purpose. Either muriatic or nitric acid will give tooth to the copper, but they must be very much diluted with water, and very great care exercised in its use.
